## LETTER FROM OUR REGIONAL MINISTER

Each day we encounter many opportunities for love, mercy and sacrifice.


My letter to you in January listed the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy. As Franciscans, our spiritual lives and the love we have for God are rooted in the image of Jesus that we see in our brothers and sisters and in all of creation. We are *always* called to reach out to others, to step *outside* of ourselves. This does not only happen when we help strangers. It also occurs when we are kind, patient and forgiving toward those whom we call our family, be they our natural family members or our brothers and sisters in fraternity.

We gain inspiration in this from our Seraphic Father who added an additional verse to his Canticle of the Creatures as he helped to bring peace between the Commune of Assisi and Bishop Guido II in 1225:

"Overcome by the climate of hate that was created in his own town because of this confrontation, Francis endeavored to put an end to it. To that end, he added an important verse to the Canticle of Brother Sun (or the Canticle of the Creatures), which he had composed a little bit earlier:

'Praise be to you, my Lord, For those who pardon for love of you, And support illnesses and tribulations: Happy those who will endure these in peace, For by you, Most High, they will be crowned.'" (Vauchez, André (2012-10-23). Francis of Assisi (p. 68). Yale University Press. Kindle Edition.)

"In Misericordiae Vultus (the papal bull proclaiming the Jubilee Year of Mercy), Pope Francis writes:



'With our eyes fixed on Jesus and his merciful gaze, we experience the love of the Most Holy Trinity.

The mission Jesus received from the Father is none other than revealing the very love that gives itself to every person without excluding anyone:

'Everything in him speaks of mercy.

Nothing in him is devoid of compassion.'"

(Pontifical Council for the Promotion of the New Evangelization (2015-10-12).

I pray that our focus during Lent, and always, may be on ACTING UPON *love, mercy and sacrifice*. Let us reach out to others. The mercy and forgiveness we show, the service we give, should be a sacrifice of the HEART.

Don't wait to forgive one another. Jesus did not ask us to make the first move before he became one of us and died for us. It is *precisely* because he died for us *before* we ever had the chance to ask for forgiveness that draws us to him in daily conversion. I pray that we don't wait to be asked to serve the poor and the suffering. May we do acts of mercy because we have been *given* so much mercy. I pray that we will always be grateful for the gifts we have been given, that we will try not to complain and that we will hand any bitterness we may feel over to God. In this way, we can open our hearts to the love that is always ours because he gives it to us freely.

We also find concrete opportunities for giving and receiving mercy all around us. This year, for example, at *Convivenza* (our Chapter of Mats), on *Saturday, April 23<sup>rd</sup>*, we hope to inspire you by offering a "*Day of Pilgrimage*." By now your Ministers should have received and shared two communications announcing Convivenza. We will gather at Sacred Heart Church in Wallington, NJ, which is a designated pilgrimage site in the Archdiocese of Newark. We will have speakers, prayer, Mass and the chance to pass through the Holy Doors together to gain the indulgence as a family. As always, there will be time for discussion, sharing and fraternity.

We will also offer *two concrete opportunities* to do works of mercy. I have described in detail both possibilities in my letter inviting everyone to Convivenza. (That letter is also available on our website and has been sent to the general membership via email.)

These two opportunities are a "Baby Shower for Birthright and Several Sources" and "Blessed Bloomers," a Mychal's Message Project. Please look at the lists of items needed and bring them with you on April 23<sup>rd</sup>. You can choose one cause or contribute to both. Please make whatever sacrifice you can.

We want you to know that your Region Council always keeps you in prayer, and we ask you to pray for us as we continue to serve you and our Region. We have been hard at work planning other interesting opportunities for you to grow in your Franciscan vocation and spirituality and as present or future servant leaders. We hope that you will join us!

We are looking forward to seeing many of you at Convivenza and when we visit your fraternities for elections and visitations. Be assured that we are always willing to help you in any way that we can, so please don't hesitate to call or email any one of us.


## SOWING THE SEEDS OF PEACE IN TROUBLING TIMES



"Jesus said to His disciples: 'In those days after that tribulation the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from the sky, and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory..."'.

So begins the gospel proclamation for the 33rd Sunday of Ordinary Time. As we approached the end of our Liturgical Year we heard about the end of our world as we have come to know it. As an active listener of the Gospel, what is your take on the Lord's return? Do you find it unsettling? The return of the Lord has been something that the Church has always fervently prayed for. The early Church's word for it was Maranatha! In the Book of Revelation John writes: "The Spirit and the Bride say, "Come." And let him who hears say, "Come." And let him who is thirsty come, let him who desires take the water of life without price...He who testifies to these things says, "Surely I am coming soon." Amen. Come, Lord Jesus! (Maranatha).

In the prayer that Jesus taught us, he says: "Pray then like this: Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come." How often do we stop to think about what we are asking for when we utter this beautiful prayer. We are begging for the Lord's return...today! When I was quite a bit younger the "end of the world" by way of the Lord's return was something that I was fearful of. That was mainly due to the fact that I perceived God as Someone who, when I finally meet Him, would be a reactive God concerning to my fallen nature. Did you ever hear your mother say: "Just wait until your father gets home!". Anxiety sets in. Years later I have come to learn two things. First, God is Pro-Active and not as I feared earlier, re-active. Secondly, when he does return as promised I will be meeting a friend who I have encountered many, many times through the beautiful Sacraments of the Church. God is pro-active in that "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth"...and that "God so loved the world that he gave his only-begotten Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish, but have eternal life." God is pro-active in that he provides us with shelter: "And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my Church, and the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven... ." After his resurrection from the dead, he continued being pro-active: Although the doors were locked our Lord appears to the disciples and says, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, even so I send you."

And when he had said this, he breathed on them, and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven...." This Divine Friend embraced me in my baptism, anointed me with holy oil and sacred chrism, called me to live a holy life... feeds me with his Body and his Blood... he is my Advocate by way of Confirmation...removes the burden of my sins in the confessional and heals me. This God is no stranger to me. Thomas Merton once wrote that he had not been much moved by the concept of getting into heaven after muddling through this present life. On the contrary, his conversion to Catholicism began with the realization of the presence of God in this present life, in the world...and that his task as Christian is to live in full and vital awareness of this ground of his being and

I tend to agree with Merton. We encounter God often through the gifts of the Sacraments in our life and through the love and sacrifice we show to our neighbor. The darkening of the sun and the moon and the falling of the stars we heard mentioned in the gospel are meant to represent the failure of all the false gods that we have entertained in our lives and once they are removed it is Jesus Christ who takes center stage. And so...when the Lord returns as he promises we should not be fearful of a reactive stranger, but grateful for the ultimate encounter with a loving friend who has always been there for us. Maranatha!

# Singing for Pope francis

am a Secular Franciscan in the Our Lady of the Angels Region and a member of the Archdiocesan Festival Choir who sang for Pope Francis's Mass at Madison Square Garden on September 25th.

I've been asked to give a brief account of what it was like to sing for Pope Francis.

First, I would like to tell you a little about the Archdiocesan Festival Choir. We were founded over 30 years ago to sing for Advent Concerts hosted by St. Joseph's Seminary in Yonkers, NY. Since then our role has expanded. Now we have done Masses for several Papal visits, the Consistory Mass for Cardinal Dolan in Rome, Italy; concerts in places such as the Holy Land, the Chrism Mass during Holy Week at St. Patrick's Cathedral, as well as Diaconate and Priestly Ordinations. At many of these events, we sing with the St. Patrick's Cathedral Choir under the direction of Dr. Jennifer Pasquale, who conducts both choirs. We are drawn from many parishes in the Archdiocese and range in age from 16 to 90. Many are professional musicians and many are not. The common factor is a love of choral singing.

Preparation for the Papal Mass began in late July 2015 when we first received an email from Dr. Pasquale informing us of our invitation to sing and asking us to confirm that we would be able to attend practices to that end. We all responded quickly! A series of subsequent emails informed us of what information we would need to furnish to homeland security and secret service for security purposes. A series of back and forth emails ensued as more and more information was required. Finally, we were cleared.

Next, we started practice. I think everyone was amazed at the number and complexity of the music for the Mass. It consisted of about 28 pieces, in four to seven parts (SATB plus 3) and four languages- English, Latin, Spanish and German.

We began. Initially, we had four practices of two to two-and-a-half hours each at St. Joseph's Seminary in Yonkers. These were held at night with piano accompaniment only. As each practice took place the pieces of music started to really come together and sound very nice. Then came the week of the Papal Mass!



On Tuesday, September 22, we arrived at St. Joseph's and boarded a chartered bus to the SIR 37 Studio on 37th Street. There we met up with the choir from St. Patrick's Cathedral and a full orchestra. We all practiced together for the first time.

It was glorious! We also had a chance to listen to several of the choirs who would be the entertainment prior to the Papal Mass.

Our second sojourn into Manhattan was truly an endurance test for all involved. I was out of bed by 4:30 a.m. and

en-route to Yonkers by 6:00 a.m. The bus left Yonkers at 7:30 a.m. and we were at the Garden by 9:00. When we arrived we saw where we would be during the

Mass. Our location was behind and somewhat below the Papal altar. The orchestra was in the middle and we formed a horseshoe around the orchestra. The musicians had seats, we had risers, but NO SEATS! Now picture 4 hours of singing without sitting down on a chair! We became quite adept at sitting on the floor of the risers and jumping up when our turn to sing arrived. Things ran late and our "lunch" was at 2:20. The bus was leaving at 2:30 promptly! Eat and run? Absolutely!



Finally, the day of the Mass arrived. Wake up at 8, leave for Yonkers at 10 and get into the city by 10:45. Then Security started in earnest. We joined many tour buses in a parking lot about 20 blocks from Madison Square Garden, where we were told to leave all belongings on our seats and get off the bus. The bus was checked by Homeland Security, Secret Service, NYPD and German Shepherd dogs.

We languished there for an hour waiting for an all clear from the Garden. It must have suddenly occurred to someone that the choir was missing in action because we then had a Police escort to the Garden. We were escorted past LONG lines of people waiting to go through security and brought to our waiting room.

We had lunch and then watched the pre-mass concert on closed circuit TV. After that, we went to our spot behind the altar to wait. We were all sitting around on the risers when suddenly a roar went up:

THE HOLY FATHER HAD ARRIVED! Never have I seen a ragtag group of singers transform into a Papal Choir so fast!! Mass began, we sang and it was wonderful!

I am humbled by the absolutely beautiful voices I had the privilege of singing with. These are people who have a wonderful gift, but also are people who use that gift for the honor and glory of God.



Everyone was so very dedicatedthe orchestra, the choir, the choir director.

For some it was their job, but for most they received no pay. They gave of their time and talent to glorify the Lord and to welcome His representative on Earth!




People came by every day wanting to see the transformation in progress.

## FRANCIS OF ASSISI AND FRANCIS OF ROME

ST. Mary's Church in Pompton Lakes, NJ - (ST. Mary of the Assumption Fraternity) held a month-long series of different Keynote Talks during the month of October 2015 titled "Francis Week".

On Tuesday, October 6, "FRANCIS OF ASSISI AND FRANCIS OF ROME" was presented. The keynote speaker was Fr. Dan Horan, OFM. Here is a summary of his presentation.

SAINT FRANCIS AND POPE FRANCIS: INSIGHTS FROM FATHER DAN HORAN, OFM

Was Francis of Assisi a rebellious, radical reformer? Or a loyal, obedient son of the Church?

That was just one of several thought-provoking questions posed by Father Dan Horan, OFM, at "Francis of Assisi and Francis of Rome," part of the 2015 celebrations of Saint Francis at Saint Mary's parish in Pompton Lakes, New Jersey.

Father Dan's answer to the question: both images are correct, but neither is complete. Saint Francis practiced ecclesiastical obedience, not blind loyalty, Father Dan explained. On occasions when the Roman Church seemed to be in conflict with the teachings of Jesus, Francis's primary loyalty was to the Gospel.

Two examples Father Dan gave:

• During Francis' time, the church sanctioned the expulsion of those with leprosy from the community—even sending lepers off with a ritual reminiscent of the funeral liturgy. In one of his conversion experiences, Francis overcame the "bitterness" he usually felt passing the place where lepers were exiled, when he encountered a leper on the road, dismounted his horse, and embraced the man—just as he would embrace Jesus.

Does this scene not remind us of our Holy Father Pope Francis, descending from his scaled-down "Popemobile" to embrace the disfigured, the alienated, and the physically challenged?

• On Francis's peace mission to visit Sultan al-Malik al-Kâmil during Pope Innocent III's Fifth Crusade, the Cardinal designated to oversee the Christian army in Damietta, Egypt, forbade the little man from Assisi to cross the border into Muslim territory. Against the cardinal's orders, Francis continued on his journey to complete his mission.

In the same way, Pope Francis eludes categorization, almost allowing himself to be used as God's pawn as he responds to the voice of the Holy Spirit. Picture him on the first Holy Thursday of his papacy, washing prisoners' feet at a juvenile detention center in Rome. Participants included young incarcerated women, not all of them Christian. [To protests from by-the-book clerics, Francis might reply that he did what Jesus would have done.]

Father Dan noted the overlap between the Ignatian spirituality by which this Jesuit Argentinean archbishop lives and the Franciscan style foretold by his choice of the name Francis.

It was soon clear that the humble "bishop of Rome" was thinking, not of the great Jesuit missionary, Saint Francis Xavier, but of *II Poverello*, as he bowed before the joyous throngs in Saint Peter's Square and asked for us all to bless him. ["Not just Catholics in good standing," Father Dan pointed out, but everyone in the world.]

At a glance, we see that Pope Francis has joyously embraced Saint Francis's traits of poverty, reform, peacemaking, and love of creation. But Father Dan urged a closer look at each of these qualities—particularly poverty.

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus did not begin the Beatitudes with "Blessed are those who don't have enough to eat, who go to bed hungry," Father Dan said; rather, as in the Gospel of Matthew, "Blessed are the poor in spirit," that is, those who embrace evangelical poverty. Material poverty, he explained, is an evil that we should actively resist, especially as it affects the most vulnerable members of society; Spiritual poverty can tempt us to compartmentalize our faith within our lives, practicing devotions instead of devoting our entire selves to Gospel living.

Evangelical poverty, by contrast, can only be lived in humility and is never an end in itself, but a means to an end:

Solidarity with our sisters and brothers, especially the poor and the marginalized. Anyone who practices poverty as

"a battle to the bottom" is no longer poor in spirit.

Regarding peacemaking, Father Dan reminded us of Jesus' message to "Pray for our enemies; do good to those who hate you." He asked, "Why complicate something so simple?", then responded, "Because it's hard." [Too often, our tendency is to think along these lines: Jesus wasn't talking about ISIS, was he? — or Hitler?]

He reminded his listeners that the opening words of the

Franciscan peacemaking and love of creation "come in many flavors," Father Dan observed, comically demonstrating the different musical styles of "All Creatures of Our God and King" and "The heavens are telling the glory of God."

Canticle of Creatures were chosen by Pope Francis to name his groundbreaking encyclical, *Laudato Sí: On Care for Our Common Home*. Like all of creation (including "our Sister Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us," and Brother Sun, "a likeness of You"), we are called to be stewards of creation and to praise God—even though, as the Rule tells us, "no human is worthy to mention Your name." Just as all the non-human creatures praise God by being

what they are created to be, our end is to be fully human, fully alive. What that means remains for each of us to seek, discover, and become.

In Francis's "kinship model" of creation, we are made of the same substance as other creatures; we all reflect the Creator. Father Dan urged us to pray the Canticle with thought, to see the cosmos with God's eyes, and to care responsibly for those that care for us—water, oxygen, plant life, and animals. How are we treating our "siblings"?

Just as this account expresses but a small part of Father Dan Horan's presentation, his appearance at Saint Mary's provided a mere glimpse of what we can expect when this deeply thoughtful, engaging young friar gives the keynote presentation this summer at the *Quinquennial* in Saint Louis.



## THE 2015 FRANCISCAN PEACE AND JUSTICE AWARD by Bob Stronach, ofs

The 2015 Franciscan Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) Award recipient was Sister Caritas Barajingitwa, LSOSF, for her work with children orphaned by the AIDS epidemic in Uganda. Sister is shown hugging JPIC Commission Chair Carolyn Townes, OFS, at the awards ceremony.

Sister Caritas Barajingitwa, LSOSF, dreamed of providing a loving home and practical education for orphans in Africa. With the help of American donations, that dream came true when she opened Holy Family Vocational Orphanage in Southern Uganda. For her work, during the national chapter meeting held in Clinton, NJ, on October 13-18, the Secular Franciscan Order awarded her the Franciscan Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC) Award.

JPIC Commission Chair Carolyn Townes, OFS, introduced Sister Caritas, citing her for creating a future for children of AIDS victims. The award includes a \$2,500 prize. "The money is enough to pay the orphanage's bills for several months", said Sister Caritas, a member of the African-based Little Sisters of St. Francis.

The orphanage houses 18 children, and includes 13 acres for farming plus 13 acres for future dormitories and a new school, eventually to accommodate 100 children. Sister Caritas got the idea for the orphanage while pursuing a master's degree in education in the late 1990s at McGill University in Montreal, Quebec. In fact, the idea became her master's thesis, she said.

"Going back to Uganda, I thought it would be just a matter of putting the project into place," she recalled. "I went door-to-door begging, to no avail." But God opened another door, as she would put it. The pastor of St. Mary of the Assumption Church in Binghamton, NY, wrote a letter to the mother superior of the Little Sisters, asking her to send one of her sisters to work in his parish. The mother superior summoned Sister Caritas and told her she was going to the United States. She arrived in June 2001. Two years later, thanks to donations by American Catholics, she was able to open Holy Family Vocational Orphanage and welcome the children into its protection.

Secular Franciscans and other friends in Binghamton established the Holy Family Vocational Orphanage Foundation to continue raising funds for the orphanage and further Sister Caritas' dream. A proponent of teaching practical life skills as well as academics, Sister Caritas said the orphanage teaches home economics, carpentry, basket weaving, sewing and tailoring, and farming and animal husbandry. However, sister noted, for the orphans, "knowing that they are loved is most important" because "then they will be able to love others."



"BROTHERS AND SISTERS: I AM NOT ASHAMED OF THE GOSPEL" (Rom. 1:16).

Paul was being modest when he dictated those words. He was more than just unashamed of the Gospel; he embraced it intensely, even fiercely. Writing from prison, facing the real prospect of death, he would sum up: "For to me, life is Christ" (Phil 1:21).

One could argue that it would be 1200 years before someone would take up Paul's motto with such single-minded passion: Assisi's *poverello* and your Seraphic Father, Francis. Moreover, let me suggest that it was this uncompromising zeal that has made Francis such a universally attractive and compelling figure in every one of the eight centuries since his death.

I have visited the tomb of the great promoter of Christian charity, St. Vincent de Paul, and found an empty church; I have made a pilgrimage to the tomb of Francis' great contemporary, St. Dominic, and found an empty church. The same can often be said of the even the Basilica of St. Paul Outside the Walls in Rome, built, tradition says, over the relics of the Apostle.

But to visit Assisi on any given day, as so many of you know, is to join *thousands* drawn there by the desire to capture something of Francis' spirit, the desire to be able to return to families, jobs, parishes more committed to saying with Paul, with Francis: "For to me, life is Christ."

This point—that as human beings we are instinctively pulled toward a life of spiritual meaning and conviction—is made by Pope Francis at the very beginning of his *Bull of Indiction* proclaiming the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy.

The "Father's mercy," the Pope writes, which was the essence of Christ's life and ministry is,

"the fundamental law that dwells in the heart of every person who looks sincerely into the eyes of his brothers and sisters on the path of life". (Misericordiae Vultus, no. 2)

The "fundamental law that dwells in the heart of every person." In other words, we were created for Christ; we are incomplete without Christ.

Now how do I, a non-Franciscan, put this correctly?

There is, in my view, a place within the Church, within Franciscanism, for the St. Francis who preached to the birds; for the romantic Francis of the first crèche; for Francis the miracle worker; and for Francis who has become the patron of the modern ecological movement. They all are Francis, but they are not the essential Francis.

The essential Francis that our Church needs, that our culture needs, is the Francis who lived the Christ-life without apology—and who preached without apology the means by which we deepen our engagement in that life: Scripture, prayer, devotion to the Mother of God, simplicity, service, and, especially, the Blessed Sacrament.


Francis begins one of his last letters, "To the Entire Order," with the admonition:

With all that love of which I am capable, I implore all of you to show all possible reverence and honor to the most holy Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ in Whom that which is in heaven and on earth has been brought to peace and reconciled with almighty God (*Early Documents*, I, 117).

We need to hear about the Francis who loved all of creation and we need to hear more about the devout, the humble Francis, the saint of the Eucharist. May the Lord, through the intercession of St. Francis, bless the work of your important gathering, that the Secular Franciscan Order in the United States be an instrument by which followers of Jesus are inspired to be ambitious to boast of that which alone is worth boasting about: "For to me, life is Christ."

## The NAFRA Elections "FROM ONE OBSERVER"

he phrase,

observed the national elections
for the NAFRA council members.

I arrived that Saturday morning during a lively discussion and voting on contributions to the many causes NAFRA supports. It was especially impressive to me to hear CIOFS (Consilium Internationale Ordo Franciscanus Saecularis) Minister General, Tibor Kauser, OFS, (below) describe the fraternities of Jerusalem, Nazareth, and Palestinian Christians, comparing and contrasting their membership, their locations, their relative security, and their funding needs.



Next, outgoing members of the council were honored for their service, with smiles and tears marking the assembly's grateful applause.

Minister General Tibor Kauser also oversaw the election process, from careful explanations of "absolute majority" and tiebreakers to the proper folding of ballots. In Tibor's native Hungary, he recalled, only one name would appear on any ballot; thus, he is more aware than most of us listeners were what a privilege the opportunity to vote is, particularly in electing servant leadership.

"I wish you a very fruitful and blessed Chapter. You are instruments of the Holy Spirit," he reminded the 36 voting members, who agreed that they would not leave the room until the election process was completed. "It is only God who truly elects each of the officers through you. Please be very present, silent, and collected." He also asked for silence after the announcement of each winning candidate, until he or she had accepted the position for the next three years.



Of four candidates for National Minister, Jan Parker, was elected on the third ballot. She later called herself, "thankful that we do not serve alone," describing the newly elected council as "a circle of gifts and talents, closed by your prayers."

Mary Bittner, was elected Vice Minister. Mattie Ward, was elected Secretary and Jerry Russo, won the ballot for Treasurer. Mary Stronach was re-elected Int'l Councilor, along with three additional National Councilors elected: Mary Frances Charsky, (who was also voted to serve as substitute for the alternate Int'l Councilor), Awilda Guadalupe, and Joan Geiger.

Tibor Kauser told the new officers, "The service entrusted to you can only be accomplished with a lot of prayer." To those "not elected this time," he praised for their willingness to be candidates.

When St. Francis was told by our Lord to rebuild His church, I thought, that if the San Damiano Cross hanging in the ruined church looked like this one, wouldn't Francis have tried to repair it as part of the restoration?

So I got out my paints and brushes and started the project. See the "before" photos of the cross from when I brought it home, until the final "after" photos of the finished product.

The Fraternity was pleased with the restoration and I was honored to be able to do the work. It had been years since I was able to do this kind of art. I am blessed to have had the opportunity to have worked on this Holy And Blessed Cross of San Damiano.


After having completed the restoration of the San Damiano Cross, I was approached by a fraternity sister about two wooden statues of Friars. They were brown with paint missing in dark creases and a broken hood on one of them. Apparently they were given to her and she asked if I could do something with them. I looked at them and wondered if I could. I took them home.

I began by sanding them down to try and remove the dark creases and to prepare the wood for repair. I painted them and then treated them with a gloss to preserve the wood.

I was able to find a round relic locket of St. Conrad of Parzham that I placed around the one friar's neck while St. Lawrence of Brindisi, a scholar, is holding a book.

Our Fraternity agreed that we would give our Spiritual Assistant, Fr. Brian Tomlinson OFM, Cap. our two Friars as a gift in honor of his 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Ordination to the Holy Priesthood.

I love my vocation. I am so blessed that the Lord has called me to serve Him as a Secular Franciscan."



















## ANTARCTICA - Esperanza Base

(Spanish: Base Esperanza, "Hope Base") is a permanent, all year-round Argentine research station in Hope Bay, Trinity Peninsula (Graham Land, Antarctic Peninsula). It is one of only two civilian settlements on Antarctica. The Base's motto is "Permanencia, un acto de sacrificio" ("Permanence, an act of sacrifice"). The base was built in 1953, and



the first Catholic chapel, named after Saint Francis of Assisi, was built here in 1976.

Built in 1953, the base houses 55 inhabitants in winter, including 10 families and 2 school teachers. Provincial school #38 Presidente Raúl Ricardo Alfonsín, was founded in 1978 and acquired independent status in 1997. It maintains the furthest South Scout troop. The base has some measure of fame because it is the birthplace of Emilio Marcos Palma, the first person to be born in Antarctica. The base has tourist facilities that are visited by about 1,100 tourists each year.






