

LETTER FROM OUR REGIONAL MINISTER

June 15, 2015

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

This past weekend, your Regional Executive Council gathered in Beacon, NY, at the St. Lawrence Retreat Center to begin the process of "visioning" for our region. It was a tremendously fruitful weekend due to the hard work of a number of Council members and the presence of the Holy Spirit throughout our time together.

One of the themes that will heavily influence the future vision for our region has to do with our identity as Secular Franciscans—how we see ourselves and how others see us. It is interesting to note that even before our weekend discussions took place, Brother Doug and I have been raising precisely this theme with the fraternities we have been visiting.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A SECULAR FRANCISCAN?

Profession is by its nature a permanent and perpetual commitment.

At the moment of profession, we are linked and bound to the Order. We become part of a specific Fraternity; our life acquires meaning within the Fraternity; we serve our brothers and sisters.

Profession is the basis of opening our hearts, taking on activities and service to the advantage of the Order, of society and of the Church.

To be professed means assuming a continual pledge of evangelical conversion.

The perpetually professed, according to their capability and possibility and in the light of the interests of the Order, cannot be exempt, except for serious motives, from accepting the positions or functions asked of them at any level in the Fraternity whenever requested.

A SECULAR FRANCISCAN

(OR SOMEONE WITH A VOCATION TO BE A SECULAR FRANCISCAN) . . .

Is a strong practicing Catholic. Has the desire to follow the Gospel and shows:

Simplicity (without pretense). Poverty (Confidence in the Father). Humility (Truth of what and who we are before God). Minority (Recognition that we are servants-not superior). Abandonment to God (Trusting in God's unconditional love). Has a personal faith relationship with Jesus (not just intellectual or devotional). Is hope-filled. Recognizes the need for daily conversion. Lives the Rule and Constitutions and is committed to fraternity life. Trusts in God and the importance of God in his/her life. Has reverence for all creation and a sense of respect for it. Is willing to share creative ideas and life with the fraternity. Is willing to be present to his/her brothers and sisters in fraternity. Is willing to witness to the Gospel through word and example. Prays daily-especially Mass (when possible) and the Liturgy of the Hours. Actively collaborates (in accordance with personal situation) in the obligations and animation of the fraternity.

Our vocation is a gift and a commitment that must be strengthened continually. We are not enrolled in a club or society; we have made a life commitment at profession. How we live our lives and how we see ourselves, is what others will see. People should recognize us as Catholics and as Franciscans without our having to tell them. First, however, we must recognize ourselves. When we look in the mirror, do we see a Secular Franciscan looking back at us?

The Commitment checklist that follows can be used privately or with the entire fraternity. The more we meditate on our commitment and on our Rule and Constitutions, the more we will be transformed in our Franciscan lives as followers of Christ.




THERESA HARRIS, OFS Called home to the Lord May 26, 2015.

The Eucharist is the summary of our daily living. In giving us the Eucharist, Jesus said: "Take it; this is My body." "This is My blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many." Jesus not only said those words, He lived them by a life of self-giving and by giving His life on the Cross.

You and I are to do the same. Our daily lives must reflect the Eucharist we celebrate. Each day, we must give of ourselves, pour out our lives in service and in love for others. How? St. John Chrysostom wrote a remarkable passage in which he brought out the intimate connection between the Eucharistic Body of Christ and the Mystical Body which is the Church. Speaking of the precious vessels of the altar and of the other liturgical objects by which we surround the Blessed Sacrament with honor, the Greek Father pointed out that it was even more important to honor the body of Christ by our interaction with our brothers and sisters in need. In this way, we are not only doing good to Him in the person of the poor, but we are making our own souls into sacred vessels of gold which give Him great glory. St. Chrysostom writes:

If you wish to honor the Eucharistic Victim, offer your own soul for which the Victim was immolated. Make your soul all of gold. If your soul remains viler than lead or clay, what good does it do to have a golden chalice? Do you wish to honor the Body of Christ? Then do not distain Him when you see Him in rags. After having honored Him in Church with silken vestments, do not leave Him to die of cold outside for lack of clothing. For it is the same Jesus Who says, "This is My Body" and Who says, "You saw Me hungry and did not give Me to eat – What you have refused to the least of these My little ones, you have refused to Me." The Body of Christ in the Eucharist demands pure souls, not costly garments. But in the poor He demands all our care. Let us act wisely; let us honor Christ as He Himself wishes to be honored: the most acceptable honor to one whom we would honor is the honor which he desires, not that which we ourselves imagine. Peter thought he was honoring his Master by not letting the Lord wash his feet; and yet it was just the opposite. Give Him then the honor which He Himself has asked for, by giving your money to the poor. Once again, what God wants is not golden chalices, but golden souls."

St. John Chrysostom, Homily 50 on St. Matthew,3

The Mass that we gather at is then the banquet of charity, of fraternal unity in Christ. It is the sharing of Christ's love with one another: so that the strong help the weak to encounter Christ and the weak, in their turn, give the strong an opportunity to love Jesus more by loving Him in His members. Without this perspective, our communions cannot attain the fullness and the joy that Christ desires them to have. As long as our love for Jesus in the Sacrament of His love is a love only for the Head, without sincere and warm affection for all our brothers and sisters, without interest in the spiritual or physical needs of His members, our spiritual life will remain stunted and incomplete.

In Eucharist, we celebrate here in worship what we must live out there in daily life. That is why the Eucharist is essential to Catholic belief and fundamental to Catholic life.

FORMING THE FORMATOR WORKSHOP



On May 16, 2015, a region-wide formation workshop entitled "Forming the Formator" was held at St. John Vianney and St. Elizabeth of Hungary Fraternity in Paterson, NJ. The workshop, which consisted of four sessions, was presented by the Regional Formation Team and was attended by the Ministers, Spiritual Directors, Spiritual Assistants and Formation Teams of many of the fraternities throughout the region.

THE FIRST SESSION,

Roles, Responsibilities and Resources for Successful Formation, was presented by Ed Wojciechowski, OFS and covered the roles and responsibilities of the Formation Director, Spiritual Assistant and Formation Team. This session also included practical suggestions and guidelines for selecting resources for Initial and Ongoing Formation including books, audio and movies, websites and other online resources. THE SECOND SESSION,

Practical Tips for Formators, was presented by Diane Menditto, OFS, and dealt with practical methods for educating adult learners. Diane highlighted the need for participatory learning and the need to spend time in prayer and meditation as part of the fraternity's formation meeting. Diane stressed the need to rely on each other to work in a collaborative and constructive environment in order to serve our fraternity as Formators.



THE THIRD SESSION, Adult Formation in the Secular Franciscan Order, was presented by Nancy Conroy, OFS, and accentuated the need for Witness. As Formators, we can't share what we don't have! The process of adult formation is about forming relationships modeled on our life with Jesus. Nancy wrapped up her presentation with a hands-on exercise for developing a Formation Session.

THE FOURTH SESSION, Spirituality of the Formator, was presented by Ron Pihokker, OFS.

Ron emphasized that spirituality is who we are and what we do because of what we believe and what we have experienced.

Ron spotlighted the characteristics of Christian Spirituality and Franciscan Spirituality. He drew attention to Formators as people who are called

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to live the mission of the Church and as companions on the formation journey.

I'd like to thank the **St. John Vianney and St. Elizabeth of Hungary Fraternity, in Paterson, NJ,** for hosting the workshop. Their warm welcome and Franciscan hospitality made everyone feel right at home!

I'd also like to thank everyone who attended the workshop and my co-presenters Diane, Nancy and Ron for making this a successful day of learning and Franciscan fellowship.

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IMPORTANCE OF FORMATION

The journey of formation, which should develop throughout life, begins with entrance into the fraternity. Mindful that the Holy Spirit is the principal agent of formation and always attentive to collaboration with Him, those responsible for formation are:

the candidate, the entire fraternity, the council with the minister, the master of formation, and the spiritual assistant.

The entire community is engaged in the process of growth by its own manner of living.

The candidates are guided to read and meditate on Sacred Scripture, to come to know the person and writings of Francis and of Franciscan spirituality, and to study the Rule and Constitutions. They are trained in a love for the Church and acceptance of her teaching. The laity practice living their secular commitment in the world in an evangelical way.







The formation of the brothers and sisters takes place in a permanent and continuous way.

It should be understood as an aid in the conversion of each and everyone and in the fulfillment of their proper mission in the Church and in society.

"The importance of formation has emerged as the essential element to guarantee an authentic and deep sense of belonging, rooted in a clear notion of identity and knowledge of the true nature of the OFS and of its place in the Franciscan Family and in the Church."

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ROLE OF THE FORMATION DIRECTOR

The master of formation has the following duties:

- to coordinate, with the help of the other members of the council, the formative activities of the fraternity.
- to instruct and enliven the inquirers during the time of initiation, the candidates during the period of initiation formation, and the newly professed.
- to inform the council of the fraternity prior to profession, concerning the suitability of the candidate for a commitment to live according to the Rule.

DEFINITION OF A FORMATION TEAM

- two or more persons who work together on common formation goals.
- who understand they must work in harmony to accomplish these goals.

GROUND RULES FOR INTERACTING AS A TEAM

- A high level of interdependence exists.
- Trust and mutual respect are present.
- Team members have good people skills and are committed to the team approach.
- They civilly and respectfully suggest correction and accept correction.
- They are willing to see a different perspective and better yet, seek out other's perspectives.
- They are willing to take risks and dream big.



Role OF THE Spiritual Assistant

The principal task of the assistant is to communicate Franciscan spirituality and to co-operate in the initial and continuing formation of the brothers and sisters.

The spiritual and pastoral care of the OFS, entrusted by the Church to the Franciscan First Order and the TOR, is the duty, above all, of their general and provincial ministers. The altius moderamen, of which Canon 303 speaks, belongs to them.



The purpose of the *altius moderamen* is to guarantee the fidelity of the OFS to the Franciscan charism, communion with the Church and union with the Franciscan family, values which represent a vital commitment for the Secular Franciscans.

By virtue of the vital reciprocity between the religious and the secular members of the Franciscan Family and in regard to the responsibilities of major superiors, spiritual assistance to the fraternities of the OFS at all levels must be assured as a fundamental element of communion.



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

A FORMATION REFLECTION by Ed Johnson, Ofs



Reflecting on my Franciscan formation is something that is rather difficult to put into words. I suspect that spiritual experiences are often this way. I still see myself as a very unlikely Franciscan. That I have entered the order at all is probably a true testament to the power of the Holy Spirit.

I say I'm an unlikely Franciscan because my life experience has been in fields that are definitely far removed from the culture of our order. In fact, it would be hard to find fields more involved with the secular world, then those that I was involved in.

I initially worked as a newspaper man, but most of

my professional life was spent as either a soldier or police investigator. As an infantry officer, I was trained to accomplish my missions by the efficient application of lethal force. Thankfully, I was never called upon to serve in combat. But combat was the purpose I was trained for.

Afterwards, my career was in law enforcement. The majority of that time was spent investigating violent crimes and working to apprehend those who perpetrated those crimes. It was a job that repeatedly showed the worst people have to offer. Without going into vivid detail, 17 years on the homicide detail drove home the realization that evil exists in the world and made it seem that God was far away. This background had a profound effect on my life and my faith.

I never doubted the reality of God, but I think I was at best a nominal Catholic, and probably a lukewarm one at that. It would be accurate to say that I knew of Jesus, but did not know him. I subscribed to the maxim "God favors the side with the most artillery."

In a sense, my formation began before I applied to our order. It came with a recognition that I was traveling in the wrong direction. How I came to that conclusion I'm at a loss to explain. But part of it was a recognition that the force of law was not an adequate tool for solving our world's needs or problems. Having come to that realization, I quietly returned to our church and its sacraments.

For reasons I still can't explain, I became interested in St. Francis. I began reading a very secular account of his life entitled "The Reluctant Saint." Although it questioned aspects of the Francis story, particularly his receipt of the stigmata, it also presented a picture of a truly devout and good man. A man of non-violence, charity and true faith. He was also presented as someone who didn't start out that way.

In short, Francis seemed real to me. I followed that book by reading Chesterton's "St. Francis of Assisi." This presented Francis from another perspective.

Still not quite understanding all of it, I did an Internet search about Francis and Franciscans. It brought me to the OFS and to a meeting of St. Peter's Fraternity. I initially attended more out of curiosity than a commitment to join. But after reading the materials from that meeting, I decided I needed to know more about this order, and shortly thereafter, I decided to begin the formation process, still not sure if I would ultimately commit to our order.

Some folks come to spiritual awareness in a blinding flash, similar to St. Paul. For me, it is been an almost glacial process. While I have no reservations about the profession I will make, I still have questions as to whether or not I am deserving of admission to our order. It's hard not to question one's suitability when you look at the standards exemplified by so many in our order's long history.

I can answer affirmatively because of time spent before the Blessed Sacrament and reflections on materials we discussed in some of our formation sessions. In particular, our discussions on St. Peter, the apostle who so often fell short of the mark and yet ultimately rose to the occasion. To me, the lesson was clear. God calls us to serve despite, or maybe because of, our imperfections.

As someone noted: "The apostles were all far from perfect, and yet they were chosen by Jesus himself." After the Lord's crucifixion, these unlikely candidates would ultimately perform heroically.

So as I make my profession, I look forward to my service as a Franciscan, knowing that it is not the completion of a mission, but another step in a continuing conversion and a quest to better understand the Lord in the ways we can serve him.

THE release of Pope Francis' encyclical *"Laudato Si'"* on June 18 energized the friars of Holy Name Province through the pope's call for immediate, inclusive dialogue and action to address the related challenges of poverty and global climate change.

As many media organizations have mentioned, and the pope himself explained in his encyclical, "Laudato Si'" or "Praised Be," is drawn from a prayer attributed to the friars' founder, St. Francis of Assisi, which praises God as He is witnessed through creation. While the prayer can be seen as a romantic portrayal of creation, it reminds people that the environment and humanity, as a special element of the ecosystem, are inherently intertwined.

In a <u>Holy Name Province news release</u>¹, Provincial Minister Kevin Mullen, OFM, said, "Pope Francis' analysis of the current world situation, one marked by great poverty and inequality, and global climate change, gives us a great deal to think about and a way to focus the friars' work. As a Franciscan, I am energized by his use of St. Francis as a model for all of us to follow. The encyclical has put me and my fellow Franciscans on special notice. It compels us to take the pope's message to heart. What an incredible gift from our Holy Father."

He continued, "The call to dialogue and action gives renewed encouragement for the many initiatives being carried out in the ministries of Holy Name Province in support of the poor and the environment. Our ministries do a lot of good work. This call just highlights the importance of this particular focus and, hopefully, will inspire our friars and partners-inministry with whom we serve to do even more." "The Franciscans have a long history of standing with those most in need and today that includes those who suffer the consequences of environmental degradation and the destruction of God's creation," according to a <u>June 18 post</u>² on the blog of Holy Name Province's Office of Development. The post lists six of the most serious challenges facing "our common home."

A FRANCISCAN PERSPECTIVE

The day before the encyclical was released, Fr. George Corrigan, OFM, took to the airways in Tampa, Florida for an interview on Spirit FM 90.5, Tampa Bay's hit Christian music station.

He explained the meaning of the word encyclical to the hosts of "The Big Big House Morning Show," and described the connection between the encyclical's title and St. Francis' "Canticle of the Creatures."

When speculating what perspective the encyclical might contain, George said, "I think you'll find the focus is not on the science of climate change, but the way we consider and make choices. We consume goods and consume energy, but not necessarily in a mindful way. We make these choices every day in life, but do we make them in a mindful way, keeping in mind concern for the consequences?"

Soon after the encyclical was released, Fr. Daniel Horan, OFM, wrote a column for *America* magazine, <u>http://americamagazine.org/issue/franciscan-character-laudato-si</u> highlighting the connection between the document and the Franciscan charism.

"From among the many Franciscan themes that arise in 'Laudato Si',' at least three are worth highlight from the onset: leaving behind 'naïve romanticism,' recognizing the inherent value of all creation, and seeing the connection between abject poverty and environmental degradation," Fr. Daniel wrote. He added, "For Francis of Assisi, radical lifestyle change was required to authentically follow the Gospel. Embracing evangelical poverty as a means of protest against social injustices and a means toward closer solidarity led him among the poor and outcast of his day. Concurrently, his renunciation of the power systems of his society allowed him to — like St. Bonaventure — see God in all things and become a nature mystic. Today, we too are called to change our lives to follow the poor man of Assisi who has so inspired the present bishop of Rome to teach us with such authority and clarity rarely seen before."

Most encyclicals "end up sitting on a shelf," according to Patrick Carolan, executive director of the Franciscan Action Network. In an interview with Inside Climate News, Carolan pointed out that while Church leaders and theologians may talk about encyclicals, they rarely get the attention of the wider world. This document, of course, is different. "I've never seen a buzz [like this] around an encyclical my whole life," said Carolan, who pointed out that interest is coming from "people of all faiths and environmental groups."

The Franciscan Action Network is collaborating with the World Wildlife Fund and the Sierra Club to organize webinars and other educational opportunities to bring the pope's message to mainstream environmental groups. Fr. Jacek Orzechowski, OFM, of St. Camillus Church in Silver Spring, Md., was also interviewed by InsideClimate News. He affirmed that the encyclical would allow St. Camillus parishioners to "continue to challenge ourselves" on sustainability and climate action.

TURNING TO AN 'INTEGRAL ECOLOGY'

The discussions and use of the encyclical "will play a significant role in the planning and work of Holy Name Province and the ministries that it serves," according to Russ Testa, director of the Province's Office of Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation.

Pope Francis's words from paragraph 48 of the encyclical:

"The human environment and the natural environment deteriorate together; we cannot adequately combat environmental degradation unless we attend to causes related to human and social degradation."

Throughout the encyclical, the pope analyzes the cause of this deterioration. The root of the decline, according to Pope Francis, is the disordered way that people hold technology, consumption and individualism as guiding principles.

While these things are not inherently harmful when they are lived in an unbalanced way, they lead to destruction.

The pope's solution is to turn to an "integral ecology" that makes clear "the analysis of environmental problems cannot be separated from the analysis of human, family, work-related and urban contexts."

Solutions must be based on "a preferential option for the poorest of our brothers and sisters."

Father Mychal Judge statue unveiled in East Rutherford

The statue is larger than life, and befitting the legacy of Father Mychal Judge — the Franciscan Friar who left a trail of acts of kindness and courage and oversaw the spiritual needs of generations in East Rutherford and beyond.



Holding a rosary and looking out over East Rutherford, the statue of Father Mychal Judge was unveiled on June 14 as hundreds looked on. East Rutherford elected officials unveiled the bronze statue which is the centerpiece of the reconstructed and transformed park on the corner of Hoboken Road and Paterson Avenue. The property, owned by the borough of East Rutherford, sits across the street from Saint Joseph's Church where the Franciscan friar worked.

Father Judge was an FDNY chaplain who died at age 68 at the World Trade Center during the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks as he was administering last rites. The \$40,000 sculpture created by renowned artist Brian Hanlon, who has created similar statues of Padre Pio, Yogi Berra and boxer Larry Holmes, was surrounded by clergy, police and firefighters from surrounding towns as well as representatives from the NYC Fire Department, including Chaplain Fr. Chris Keenan, OFM, Rotarians, Hibernians, and Knights of Columbus. Bagpipes and drums, a color guard march and speeches, the Pledge of Allegiance, National Anthem, and a prayer prefaced the statue's unveiling.

"This is not a time for mourning and loss, but a time to recognize a life fully and well lived," said Reverend Donald Pitches of Carlstadt First Presbyterian Church. Judge left Pitches with a lasting impact more so than most.

Recalling his teenage years, "He looked over a teammate after a serious head injury in a football game and stayed with him until he was out of danger." "His compassion showed for Detective Steven McDonald [after a New York City shooting that left him paralyzed in 1986], the Pan AM Flight 800 families, and on September 11, 2001. Is that not etched and burned in our minds?"

Whether he was tending to a seriously injured teen, a police detective or people on September 11 at the World Trade Center, that was Father Mychal Judge and his life's work. In the end, 'the love you take is the love you make.' Father Judge was an inspiration to all. His life shows us how to live,"

"We come to relive the dreams of his mind, convey the message of his voice, carry the good works of his hands, and the love within his heart." The crowd launched into singing, "Let There Be Peace on Earth" in the end, and the Saint Joseph Church choir band performed.

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
