

HEEDING THE CALL OF ST. FRANCIS

IN THE NEW YORK METRO-AREA

When Zubair Simonson converted to Catholicism and got confirmed in 2012, he wasn't satisfied. "Ok, I'm Catholic now," the former Muslim thought. "Now how can I be even more Catholic?"

Zubair, who is 35 years old, does a lot of religious reading and had fallen in love with the story of St. Francis of Assisi, the 13th century friar venerated for quitting a life of privilege to serve the poor. While Mr. Simonson wanted to model his life on his medieval hero, the former marketing professional had little interest in becoming a Franciscan friar.

Instead, he joined the Order of Franciscan Seculars—an International fraternity of men and woman who often work, marry and raise families, but vow to follow the "Way of Life" outlined by St. Francis in 1221.

Following a three-year formation period, Mr. Simonson pledged to place himself on an equal basis with all people, "especially with the lowly," as the saint's directives prescribe and to purify his heart "from every tendency and yearning for possession and power."

Phew! It's a tall order for anyone in New York City, the global capital of self advancement. But Mr. Simonson has company. There are about 400,000 Secular Franciscans worldwide and more than 1,250 live in the New York metro area.

“We’re out in the world,” says Patricia Clayton, a volunteer minister serving a 30-member fraternity based at the Church of Saint Francis of Assisi in Manhattan.

“We’re in a very unique position to bring Franciscan spirituality to the workplace and to the marketplace.”

Members pare their possessions, commit to regular volunteer work and recite Psalms twice a day. Most wear a Tau cross around their neck—which they refer to as their habit. They also meet to discuss applying Franciscan principles to daily life.

Mr. Simonson says he’s content to share a Queens apartment with roommates and wait tables at the Bubba Gump Shrimp Co., a Times Square restaurant popular with tourists. The job leaves plenty of time for volunteer work and for writing fiction and essays about religion and politics.

While some servers get frustrated with patrons from abroad who don’t tip, Mr. Simonson remembers that every person was created in the image of God and deserves reverence. “It’s one of those attitudes that helps you get through life,” he says.

For some, the Order supports a lifestyle they’ve already adopted. By the time he discovered the fraternity several years ago, candidate to be professed Artie Hasegawa, now 51, had ditched a successful corporate career and big house in the New York City suburbs for a spare one-bedroom Manhattan apartment and work as a freelance business strategist doing pro-bono work for nonprofits.

These days, he says he enjoys learning from a supportive community of like-minded people who share his guiding principals.

“We have different backgrounds, but the same outlook,” Mr. Hasegawa notes.

Some are less extreme. Chris Leone, a 67-year-old lifelong Catholic who joined the order in 2004, is a director at American Express, lives in a four-bedroom house with his wife and children in Parsippany, N.J. and drives a Jeep Compass. Still, his faith influences every facet of life including his political views. Mr. Leone, who leans toward the conservative side, says his initial impulse was to keep Syrian refugees out of the U.S., for example. But after careful thinking, he brought his feelings in line with what he believes is the Franciscan position. “We need to welcome these people,” he concluded.

To join the order, candidates undergo a three-year formation process that includes classes and fraternity-meeting attendance. It culminates in a ceremony at a Mass where they publicly profess a lifelong commitment to follow the Way of Life.

Not everyone makes the finish line, says Nancy Conroy, a nurse and volunteer formation facilitator for the Franciscan Seculars. Some leave when they realize it’s a bigger commitment than joining a prayer group, or discern that God has other plans for them. Those seeking free group therapy, meanwhile, are encouraged to explore alternatives.

“Their neediness gets in the way,” Ms. Conroy says. “They are not really called to fraternity.”

The process is lengthy but gentle, says candidate to be professed Francesca Ciolino-Volano. The 68-year-old retired English teacher, now an adjunct professor at Queens College, is volunteering at a women’s shelter and giving away unneeded possessions. “I’m a little more attuned to people, a little more sensitive to what they’re going through,” she says. The feeling that something was missing has eased, Ms. Ciolino-Volano says. When out shopping these days, she often finds herself reshelving an item before leaving the store. “I’m proud of myself,” she says. “I’m learning that I don’t need a lot.”

André Cirino OFM has worked in parishes, formation, education, and the Little Portion Retreat House for the poor. His books include *Teens Encounter Christ*, *In the Womb of the Cave*, and *The Cross Was Their Book*. Since 1984 André has conducted pilgrimages to Italy, Prague, England, Mallorca, France, Germany and California for FRANCISCAN PILGRIMAGE PROGRAMS. He taught at the Franciscan International Study Centre, Canterbury, England.

Josef Raischl, OFS, a native of Germany, lives with his wife Bernadette, in Dachau and works with Hospice in Munich. He studied theology in Germany and at the Franciscan International Study Centre, Canterbury. Josef also studied in Rome at the Capuchin Franciscan Institute where he met André and developed this retreat.

André and Josef have published: *Franciscan Solitude; Journey into God; A Forty-Day Journey into God; My Heart's Quest: Collected Writings of Eric Doyle; Three Heroes of Assisi in World War II; A Pilgrimage through the Franciscan Intellectual Tradition; Bringing Forth Christ*. André and Laurent Gallant OFM published *St. Francis' Office of the Passion: The Geste of the Great King*. Josef produced the CDs for the *Office of the Passion and Love Holding Love*—mantras drawn from the writings of Saints Francis and Clare of Assisi. See our website: www.assisiourney.com

Saint Bonaventure's Journey into God



A Centennial Franciscan Retreat Experience

August 9-17, 2018

**Mount Alvernia Retreat House
Wappingers Falls, New York**

Within the present decade of this new millennium, the eighth centenary of the birth of one of the most distinguished friars of the Franciscan Intellectual Tradition has occurred: Giovanni di Fidanza, later known as St. Bonaventure. Although scholars have different opinions concerning the actual date of St. Bonaventure's birth, many have settled on 1217. While we are within this decade of the new millennium, we invite you to celebrate the eighth centenary of the birth of the Seraphic Doctor, St. Bonaventure, by attending a retreat on his masterpiece, *Itinerarium Mentis in Deum*, his *Journey into God*.

Jean Gerson (+ 1429), chancellor at the University of Paris, St. Bonaventure's alma mater, said that the *Itinerarium* is "more valuable than all literature which had ever been written," and confessed that he made the *Itinerarium* his "chosen reading for 30 years, without ever ceasing to obtain great fruit from it." And more recently, Lawrence Landini OFM (+ 2005) called this writing "a religious classic, theology rooted in experience!" And Zachary Hayes OFM (+ 2014), a Bonaventurian scholar himself, said that "virtually the whole of Bonaventure's theology is present in the few compact pages of the *Itinerarium*."

In 1259, St. Bonaventure, wanted "to satisfy the desire of (his) spirit for peace." So around the time of the thirty-third anniversary of the death of the saint, he wrote: "I was moved by a divine inspiration and withdrew to Mount LaVerna since it was a place of quiet." And there he experienced his *JOURNEY INTO GOD*.

The retreat opens with a presentation on the life of Bonaventure in order to provide a context for reflection on his work. Each of the eight days of the retreat is then dedicated to one of the chapters of *THE JOURNEY*. Each day is a balance of instruction on the text, periods for reading and personal and communal participation in eucharist, morning and evening prayer. The liturgical and para-liturgical prayer is especially designed by the presenters to disclose the profound themes in a contemporary experience.

A typical day would be spent in the following manner. After morning prayer, time is provided for reading the chapter of *THE JOURNEY* under consideration, then, an input session on the same chapter followed by quiet time. Only the Eucharist is celebrated in the afternoon, the remaining time for reflection and quiet. Evening prayer is followed by optional sharing on the chapter of the day.



Each retreatant will need two books: *Journey into God*, Raischl & Cirino; and the songbook, *Love Holding Love*, both available from Tau Publishing, Phoenix, AZ.

Peace and all good!

Today, global migration is one of the most controversial and polarizing issues all over the world. In the United States, this can be seen in the Trump administration's anti-immigration sentiments and policies. As predicted, 2018 has already seen renewed calls for a border wall, threats to the futures and safety of DACA recipients (Dreamers) and TPS holders, and an increase in ICE enforcement actions (raids).

These developments have resulted in threats of detention and deportation for vulnerable individuals and have inflicted harm and trauma on their families and communities. It must be a horrifying feeling to think of one's life as indeterminate due to a lack of legal status. We are inspired by Pope Francis' example, who reminded us that "every stranger who knocks at our door is an opportunity for an encounter with Jesus Christ, who identifies with the welcomed and rejected strangers of every age." We must reclaim our voice in the conversation on migration!

FRANCISCAN COMMON GROUND 2018 hopes to facilitate that. This year's conference theme is: "Finding a *Franciscan Voice to Migration*." The Keynote speaker is: David B. Couturier, OFM Cap., Executive Director of the Franciscan Institute at St. Bonaventure University. This will be a day of reflection, sharing and networking that will aspire to find concrete ways to put Pope Francis' four mileposts of action (*welcoming, protecting, promoting, and integrating*) into reality.

They have been doing Catholic retreats, conferences and parish missions for over 20 years on customized themes across the US and Canada. Cricket is a professed Secular Franciscan since 2000; she is a published author of four books, has served as a retreat leader and conference speaker for Franciscans and parishes, and has been a Spiritual Director for many years, including Spiritual Direction for the Deacons in the Archdiocese of Atlanta. Jerry is a liturgical musician and recording artist who has performed in concert for a number of notable occasions, such as in the Sanctuary of Martin Luther King's church, for the President of the US, and with John Michael Talbot. A singer/songwriter with 10 CDs, which include the

beautiful voices of the Aulls' five daughters, Jerry is also a jazz and big band musician and singer in Atlanta. Additionally, Jerry has been a conference and workshop speaker for Stephen Covey for over 25 years, and also teaches Theology at The Marist School. Together, the Aulls promote the Catholic tradition through interactive teaching and music.

Br. Bob Herrick, OFM Cap: Br. Bob Herrick, OFM Cap. is a friar of St. Augustine Province, headquartered in Pittsburgh, PA. He presently resides at Capuchin College in Washington, DC and is a formator for young friars who are in studies at Catholic University. Originally from Imperial, PA, Br. Bob is one of six sons, and likes to say that he was born into 'community life' by living with five other brothers! He was taught by the Franciscan Sisters from Millvale, who were very instrumental in encouraging his Franciscan vocation. Br. Bob attended St. Fidelis High School and College in Herman, PA. In 1977, Br. Bob became a novice with the Capuchins and moved to Annapolis, MD for novitiate, where he professed simple vows on July 15, 1978. He professed final vows at St. Augustine Church on August 22, 1981. Br. Bob has served in many Capuchin parishes, including those in Cleveland and Dover, OH, at York, PA, and at the Hermitage in Herman, PA. Br. Bob served as guardian of the Hermitage in Wheeling, WV for twelve years, where he also served as spiritual assistant for St. Alphonsus Secular Franciscan Fraternity, as regional spiritual assistant for Lady Poverty Region, and as assistant director at the Paul VI Pastoral Center in Wheeling, WV. He later served on the interprovincial novitiate staff in Santa Ynez, CA for four years. He is now in his second stint as formator at Capuchin College. Wherever Br. Bob has served, music has been a large part of his ministry, whether as music director in parishes and retreat centers, or as part of his formation work with the young friars. This year, Br. Bob will celebrate forty years as a Capuchin friar.
